CCMPCS's mission is to build a community in which students, parents and staff work together to educate the "whole child," the sum of the physical, emotional, social, and intellectual parts. We will implement a Montessori based curriculum to give students the hands-on tools they need to be active learners both in and outside the classroom. By offering English with Spanish enrichment or dual-language Spanish instruction to all students, we will provide a unique opportunity for students to learn a second language at an early age and develop multicultural awareness.

Principals Message

The CCM Annual Report was presented to the FCPS Board of Education February 23rd. This was the most positive report and reception of our report since the school opened. We were able to share information about the collaborative efforts between staff and families during virtual and hybrid learning last year. Yes, it was a struggle, but everyone did the best they could at the time. We were able to share our struggles with facilities and the wonderful GPA data of students who have been with us and who are now in high school. FCPS carefully considered many data points and discontinued mandated masks in schools. <u>February AMS Family Connection</u> focuses on abstraction and imagination. When children are given a wealth of materials and the agency to choose their imagination takes over. Our middle school students recently constructed roller coasters in science. What a great way to expand on concepts they learned and use their imagination in the process.

Counselors Corner

We continue supporting students with a variety of needs related to academics and social-emotional wellbeing at school. Our goal as school counselors is to be able to connect with each student at CCM.

Classroom Lessons:

In our Primary and Lower Elementary classroom lessons this month we read "After the Fall: How Humpty Dumpty Got Back-Up Again" by Dan Santat. We discussed the difference between a Fixed Mindset v. a Growth Mindset. The Lower Elementary students then finished their lessons by filling out a worksheet that had them think of 3 things they can do, and 1 thing they can't do..... YET! It is so important to remind our students that they are learning and often learning new things is hard, and so it takes time and practice! Upper Elementary classrooms will be participating in group discussions about social problem solving strategies. We will read a short story about two friends who are struggling with how to communicate and solve a friendship problem. The goal is for students to learn about the choices they have and to use strategies to solve social problems. We will put this to practice by completing a Strengths Assessment that will allow them to see how they can use their strengths in a positive way, but also areas that they can work to improve in. Lastly, students will be able to pick through strategies that they may find helpful and apply them to a few short scenarios, related to social problem solving.

Middle School students participated in a presentation from Mr. Kurtz with the Academy for the Fine Arts, located at Gov. Thomas Johnson High School. Students learned about their many different programs including: Visual Arts, Dance, Theater, Music, and Musical Theater. 

Music Notes

Kindergarten classes have celebrated February with the Spanish Valentine song "Te Quiero" and using shakers as accompaniment and Lunar New Year with "Gung Hay Fat Choi," while also learning about and playing the autoharp. Students have practiced dynamics and tempo changes with the song "Brush Your Teeth." We've brought back our "I Know A Chicken" song honoring the blues.



Lower Elementary classes are enjoying our 4 Corners game with 2nd and 3rd graders playing the rhythm patterns for others to identify. Students have been exploring the pentatonic scale with "Ring In The New Year," a Lunar New Year piece, and playing the Chicken Blues in 12 bar blues fashion. Classes still enjoy doing the "I Let Her Go-Go" dance as well.

Upper Elementary students are continuing their study of treble and bass clef reading not only with group lessons, but during independent study on our keyboards with popular TV and movie themes. Students also work in "study groups" based on the choice of song to help each other identify and locate notes on the keyboard. We have started an in depth study of the blues, to include writing our own 12 bar blues.

Middle School

Our second semester brings Independent Instrument Study and Drama to the music room! Independent Study:

Keyboard students have progressed to choosing C position songs and playing harmonic intervals, a beginning chord technique. Guitar and ukulele students are practicing string study exercises for their respective instruments, and using beginner/easy chords to practice various strum patterns.



<u>Drama</u>: students are exploring "good actor traits" and determining the most important skills an actor should have as well as working through emphasis activities and how it affects the meaning conveyed to the audience.

<u>Performing Ensemble</u>: our Middle School ensemble has been working on choral skills with a piece written in Latin that requires numerous dynamic (volume) changes and fast paced lyrics. Our sixth graders will resume Monday rehearsals on **March 7.**

Elementary Performing Ensemble: spring session starts on **Tuesday March 8**! Congratulations to ADALIZ HODGES who will represent CCM in this year's 5th grade Honors Chorus!

Spanish Spoken Here

¡Hola familias de CCM!

We have so many different learning themes happening in our upper level Spanish classes. Please read below for details about what each level is exploring.

- Montessori Spanish Experience MSE students voted for the book Agentes Secretos.y El Mural de Picasso for their next novel study. It is a historical fiction book set in the Spanish Civil War and includes the adventures of several spies as they look for hidden symbols in Pablo Picasso's famous mural Guernica. Students had several Secret Missions (aka reading and listening comprehension work!) to build their background knowledge on topics explored in the book. We have read the first two chapters and used our Spanish to compare attributes of the main characters.
- MS Spanish 2 Spanish 2 students explored the Latin American tradition of "La Fiesta de Quince Años," which is similar to a sweet 16 party but when a young girl turns 15. Students read about various elements of the celebration and how it differs from country to country. We reviewed common verbs in the past tense as we explored a "guinceañera" named Rubí and her party that went viral over 1 million people RSVP'd! We continued our review of past tense and also kicked off our Afrolatinos exploration by studying one of the most famous Afrolatinas in history, salsa singer Celia Cruz.
- MS & 6th Grade Spanish 1 Students in Spanish 1 explored forms of the verb tener/to have, estar/to be feeling or located, and ir/to go as well as reviewed high-frequency terms from previous units. Our class stories included a tale of a crazy brother who stole all of his brother's girlfriends and a second story about a penguin looking for love and friendship. In the last weeks of February and into March, Spanish 1 will be exploring various important Afrolatino figures and writing Spanish mini-biographies.
- Upper Elementary A Students in UE-A continued their journey through Peru via our class novel Llama En Lima. We explored the famous Parque de Las Aguas, a park that is filled with dancing rainbow fountains, and the coastal region of Miraflores that is popular with surfers. Recent chapters focused on various forms of the high-frequency verbs saber/to know, estar/to be feeling or located, bailar/to dance, ir/to go, and guerer/to want, and ser/to be. Students incorporated the book's high-frequency grammar and vocabulary through story summaries, partner retells, listen and draw works, and a find-the-error game called BEEP in which they got to shout at the teacher when I made an error!

We were busy learning a song of opuestos and, had so much fun that the students were eager to show their parents how well they learned it. What are we doing this month?

Kindergarten & Early Elementary

- Underhand roll technique
- Bowling

Extra Notes:

Middle school students are working outdoors in our basketball unit. We are focusing on the primary skills of basketball (dribbling and passing). We will move into modify game play to focus upon defense.

Upper Elementary students are participating in a team Handball unit. Team Handball utilizes skills from a variety of sports including basketball, soccer, lacrosse, and hockey. It is also a great activity to focus on team play and cooperative learning. The students will work outdoors as long as the weather permits.

Lower elementary and kindergarten students have been working on the underhand roll in our bowling unit. We have been focusing on body control while stepping into their toss as well as aiming at a target, more specifically the bowling pins. The students are tracking their score with scorecards, using math skills to record their bowling score. We will be moving into a Broomball unit which focuses on striking skills while manipulating a long handled implement.

Students in 6th grade meet two days a week to explore topics and skills related to Social and Emotional Learning. Recent lessons included:
