Montessori Moment

Life is not interrupted

We can all agree that the last year, almost a year and a half, was challenging. So much has been accomplished, so much remains unresolved and so much—so many—have been lost. It's hard not to see this as a moment for reflection.

Responsibilities were interrupted. Social norms were interrupted. Our daily schedules were interrupted. Our diets. Our commerce. Our sleep. Our communities. Interrupted.

But life was not interrupted.

Our children are still growing, eager and challenging and joyful and kind. They're still asking questions. They're still watching us to learn how to orient themselves in the world. They're still absorbing every moment, every new word and new observation, every stress they see us manage, every small gesture from neighbor to neighbor to remind us all that we're here, just inside the door.

Children learn, in early childhood, key lessons that will inform their paths far into the future. Is the world a safe place? On whom here can I rely? What can I control? Think about the newborn infant, who does not yet know the answer to any of these questions, or the two-year-old, who seems to be testing their early hypothesis every day, or the confident six-year-old, who is ready to begin naming the ways in which they plan to fix the world and who they're going to enlist to do it with them. By the time a child grows to elementary and middle school age, they have come to understand, in far more complicated ways than we sometimes give them their due, the environments around them and their roles within those environments.

What are the lessons our children are learning these days? Is the world a safe place? On whom here can I rely? What can I control?

The dangers of the world outside may be more evident to us these days, but, in truth, they have always been there. We can't change the nature of the world, but we can assure children that they have people on whom they can rely in their place in it and that there remain things they can control. They are looking to us, parents and teachers, to see how we respond to these unprecedented, never before, record breaking challenges, to see how they may fit here too.

Children's agency matters all the time, but especially now, when there is so much that seems to be beyond our control. What are the things that they can influence? In what ways can they still be useful and helpful and part of their community? In whom can they rely? It's a time to meet the grief with resilience, to model for children the whole range of complex, authentic human emotions, and to do so within an enacted confidence that we will be through this and that we will find strength and evolution on the other side.

Let's look for the helpers. Look for gratitude, for community, for neighbors holding space and light and hope for each other. Look for the ways in which we can be a part of that as well and make them evident for our children. Each day, we strengthen our minds, we strengthen our bodies, and we strengthen our relationships with others.

Life is not interrupted, and children are still learning.

As we begin the transition to summer, to the upcoming school year, and back to "normal," let's remember to be mindful and pay attention to the lessons.

The majority of our lessons and conversations with students have been centered around their goals for the summer, the end of the school year, and the beginning of next school year. We are asking our students, How do you want to end this school year? What do you want to accomplish this summer? What do you want to improve in next school year? Finally, How can you make this happen?

So we are asking you too! Looking back at this whole year, what was something you overcame or accomplished? What is something you can say you are proud of? 
End-of-the-year Self-Portraits

Music Notes

Kindergarten classes are continuing to practice *tempo* with the "Ballet of the Unhatched Chicks" using rhythm sticks and their feet to keep the beat when it changes. Students are also preparing for Lower Elementary by learning solfeggio hand signs while they sing intervals using so, mi, and la (soon to be the entire major scale) and recognizing long and short sounds in rhythm patterns. By the end of the school year they will be writing and reading music!

Lower Elementary students have started the treble clef study, focusing first on space notes. Line notes will be next, as well as learning a three-part round, Fish and Chips. We have just finished studying verse and refrain form using "De Colores."



Upper Elementary students are expanding their study of sixteenth notes to include eighth note combinations and syncopated rhythms. We are also expanding our melody playing on both recorder and virtual piano to include 8 and 16 measure selections.

Middle School

General Music: students are finishing up Afro Cuban and Latino Jazz by learning complicated double bell patterns such as agogo, maracatu, and maculele. Students are being very creative using metal and plastic water bottles, cans, mugs, and utensils.

Drama: students are finalizing performances for a virtual recording. Ensemble: students are also in the recording stage for "Take 5."

Spanish Spoken Here

¡Hola familias de CCM! This past school year will go down for me personally as one of challenge, growth, and celebrations. Even with the challenges and changes of virtual and hybrid learning, it has been a wonderful year in Spanish and I can thank your children for that. As we wrap up the year, here is what your children can look forward to:

Spanish 1 – We will have a brief Grammar in Context unit to help solidify some of the grammar concepts they have studied throughout the school year, but we will keep it light and brief. We will end the year with an exploration of foods from various Spanish speaking countries and use language we have learned to describe our preferences and which foods we would like to try. Students will complete a final reading, listening, and writing proficiency to determine their end-of-year proficiency placement. They have already completed a speaking proficiency placement in early May. The goal for the end of Spanish 1 is to be at a proficiency level of Novice High and have an overall course grade of C or better to advance to Spanish 2 next year. If your child has not met these requirements, I will contact you with further details.





Upper Elementary Spanish – UE students will finish up their novel study of the Spanish language chapter book El Capibara Con Botas. In addition to completing comprehension checks at the end of each chapter to show their understanding of the grammar, vocabulary, and events, students will also be able to choose from a final project menu to showcase what they have learned about one of story's settings (Amazon rainforest, Galapagos Islands, and Quito, Ecuador), an animal featured in the story, an ecological problem mentioned in the story, or how they connect to themes in the story

6th Grade Spanish 1 - I am excited to share with you that next fall, CCM will have 17 sixth grade students enrolled in Spanish 1 for high school credit – that's over half of our 6th grade population! Additionally, next year will be the inaugural year for our Montessori Spanish Experience course designed as a continuation class for students who earn credit Spanish 2 as in seventh grade.

Hola A Todos!


Spanish 2 Group

I need to start this letter by saying that I am very satisfied with the students' results in the Spanish proficiency test. They all exceeded my expectations. In class, we continue working with Chapter 5 "Ruidos en la noche". Both groups are finish writing the second class's story. For the next three weeks, MS students will be learning about the "Miskitos", an indigenous group from Nicaragua, and where they live. What happens with their land? What is their connection with the African slaves?

Primary (Pre-K and Kinder) Group

After two weeks, I finally see my PreK friends today. I was so happy to see them again. We just finish the story "La gallina que busca a su pollito", where students draw their favorite farm animals and make the sound of each farm animal along the story. In the next three classes, students will be learning about the life cycle of a chicken. PreK 3-4, will continue dancing to their favorite class video song and listening to animals' stories.

My kinder friends will finish learning/review the family members' name in Spanish. They also learned how to sign the names in Spanish. For the next three weeks, students will be learning about the parts of the house and will listen to two stories. Also, students will continue practicing their greeting; and will continue dancing to their favorite class songs.



Lower Elementary Group

LE students just finish the story #8 "Pobre Enzo" where they learned and practice the parts of the body. For the next three weeks, students will have their fourth Movie talk "Oktapodi" and will finish up the school year having a Summer song fest. Where they will vote for the favorite class song of 2021.

Lower Elementary Advance Spanish Group

LE advance Spanish group will finally finish working and reading the last three episodes of "La piñata de Renata".

Physical Education

Primary and Lower Elementary have been working on striking with a short-handled implement over this past month. What is an implement you say?! An implement is a tool that is not part of your body, so in this case it could be a tennis racquet, ping-pong paddle, or a badminton racquet. Our goals for this unit are to learn to strike (hit) an object with a paddle sending it upward and/or forward and to learn to strike with a paddle showing body control and equipment control. Students have been practicing with lollipop paddles as you can see pictured below, while using light-weight plastic balls and beanbags as hitting objects. Students have had the opportunity to practice self-control with the paddle, working with a partner using the paddle, and striking towards various targets using the paddle.

Upper Elementary students have also been working hard learning to master the skill of striking with a shorthandled implement. UE students have had similar objectives and goals as LE and Primary listed above except we try some more challenging activities that promote control of the paddle, mainly activities that involve more movement with a partner. Upper Elementary and Middle School have also completed their spring fitness tests! Every year we complete these tests once in the fall and once in the spring so that hopefully our students can see where they have improved or where they need improvement. Students should be familiar with the four fitness components that these tests are centered around: cardiovascular endurance, muscular strength, muscular endurance, and flexibility.
