CCMPCS's mission is to build a community in which students, parents and staff work together to educate the "whole child," the sum of the physical, emotional, social, and intellectual parts. We will implement a Montessori based curriculum to give students the hands-on tools they need to be active learners both in and outside the classroom. By offering English with Spanish enrichment or dual-language Spanish instruction to all students, we will provide a unique opportunity for students to learn a second language at an early age and develop multicultural awareness.

Students have been researching and learning about "Thanksgiving" this month. 

From the Art Room

Kindergarten students are learning about the elements of art and focusing on the element of line as they name and make a variety of lines in drawing, painting, and sculpture works. They are also learning about the Principle of Art, pattern, and the tradition of quilt making in North America as they create their own patterned quilt squares.







Upper Elementary students are building oil pastel skills as they practice color and value mixing techniques. They are preparing to create an oil pastel work inspired by North American artists Georgia O'Keeffe and Jean Michele Basquiat.

Middle School Sculpture students are completing

their slab pots and practicing coil building techniques by creating a coil pot skill builder.

Middle School Drawing and Painting students are developing compositions for their Wayne Thiebaud inspired still-life paintings.

All middle school art classes are reflecting on stereotypes held about Contemporary Native American Art and Artists by listening to Contemporary Native American artists talk about their work, their process, and their materials in videos about sculptor, Rose B Simpson, mixed media artist, Dyani Whitehawk, the "Native Pop" movement, contemporary Native fashion, Lloyd Kiva's interactive textile design installation, mixed media artist, Jeffrey Gibson, and the Museum of Contemporary Native Arts in New Mexico.

Music Notes

MUSIC NOTES

Kindergarten classes are filled with the sounds of November. Our 5 Fat Turkeys rhyme uses tambourines to tap a syncopated rhythm. The Mayflower dance uses movements for each of the three phrases of the song that tell the story of the Pilgrim's crossing the ocean. A Turkey Named Bert is another dance about a feathered friend with a plan not to be someone's dinner. Students are also practicing *tempo* by playing rhythm sticks along with the Little Blue Truck song that changes from fast to slow, and back again.



Lower Elementary students have enjoyed playing accompaniment on our xylophones and

glockenspiels to Fed My Horse, a Georgia mountain song. Students have learned a bordun style and alternating mallet techniques. We are now learning Salamanca Market, a round that will also use our barred instruments. Classes have also started playing the button game, a sol-mi-la singing game of secrets.

Upper Elementary students are combining their study of eighth and sixteenth note combinations with alternating mallet technique on our barred instruments like xylophones, glockenspiels, and tone bars. Classes have started their review of treble clef notation and will soon be using the rhythms from Click Beetle Clack Beetle to compose melodies for the rhyme.

Middle School

Percussion: students are finishing up final evaluations on the many percussion parts of the

Gahu dance: metals like the takes and gankogui; shekeres, as well as low and high drum parts. Our last half of the quarter will focus on more tonal work and blues style with the barred instruments. Students will learn chord structure and improvisation in the 12 bar blues style.

<u>Performing Ensemble</u>: sixth graders have been practicing after school and will soon join our 7th and 8th graders in preparation for a performance in December.

Elementary Performing Ensemble: after a small invite-only performance in December we will take a break for the winter. Spring chorus will start up in March with hopefully more openings!

Spanish Spoken Here

¡Hola familias de CCM!

Thank you for your support of our community *ofrenda* for Día de Los Muertos. It is lovely to see special photos and mementos that honor memories of loved ones. It is also a valuable teaching tool for the Spanish program because rather than just look at pictures of *ofrendas* for our cultural studies, our students get to see one as it develops and many contribute to creating it.

Please read below to learn about what students have been working on in my classes during the last month:



 Montessori Spanish Experience – Students in this class wrote Spanish essays comparing and contrasting Día de Los Muertos traditions in Mexico and Guatemala. They then had the idea to turn their essays into a book which will "live" in the Spanish classroom library for years to come. MSE will take a trip later this month to the Mexican <u>Cultural Institute</u> in Washington D.C. (affiliated with the Embassy of Mexico) to view their enormous Día de Los Muertos <u>ofrenda</u> and various exhibits highlighting the culture of Oaxaca, Mexico.

- MS Spanish 2 Spanish 2 students expanded their knowledge of Día de Los Muertos customs by studying several important traditions, including the origins and symbolism of <u>los alebrijes</u>. These fantastical, imaginary creatures are an important form of folk art in Mexico, and this class created their own <u>alebrijes</u> from clay to display on the school <u>ofrenda</u>. They also wrote a Spanish-language trivia game that we played in class to review DDLM traditions.
- MS & 6th Grade Spanish 1 Students in Spanish 1 explored Día de Los Muertos through various Spanish-language readings, <u>infographics</u>, and songs that featured our high frequency grammar and relevant vocabulary. After going through several reading and listening works designed to provide input about DDLM, students engaged in several writing and speaking works to retell their understandings of these customs and build their confidence in "outputting" in Spanish. Each student also created a digital <u>ofrenda</u> dedicated to and describing a famous historical person of their choice.
- Upper Elementary A UE-A students took a deeper look at the various items that are traditionally found on a Día de Los Muertos ofrenda including pan de muerto, velas, cempazúchitl, papel picado and others. Students selected an item and then wrote a paragraph in Spanish to describe their item and its significance. This class also applied new vocabulary and grammar structures to explore chapter 1 of our class novel, Llama en Lima. In addition to showing phenomenal comprehension of the text, this group is showing strong abilities in correctly using core vocabulary and grammar to produce original writing and speaking.

Hola!

Happy Fall, everyone!

We have certainly been busy in Spanish class so far this year, below you'll find information about what each grade has been working on.

The goal of the elementary Spanish program is to introduce elements of language learning and culture to our students. Children brains are incredible receptive to learning new languages, and, as a result, tend to pick up new languages faster than adults. The elementary program is designed as a spiral; topics are introduced in early grades, then revisited and built upon each year, allowing the students to incorporate new concepts while felling confident about what they can do with the language.

For grades Pre-K to 2nd, learning occurs mainly through discussions, games, songs, videos and movement, writing is very limited, often just a couple of words or short phrases, I do make sure they listen to as much Spanish as I can during class, this will get their ears and brain to start processing the language and get familiar with it.

For grades 3 to 6, learning occurs in the same mode as Pre-K to 2nd but written expression is introduced through short phrases. The ability to produce compete sentences and original thoughts with limited support (a novice mid proficiency level) is the goal for the end of the school year.

In the next couple of weeks, we will be working in a project about celebrations with new vocabulary and learning more about the traditions in the Latino countries.

What are we doing this month?

Kindergarten & Early Elementary

Soccer!! Manipulation with feet. Dribbling, passing, trapping, and kicking to a target Basic striking skills with hands to lead into our next activity of volleying/volleyball

Upper Elementary and Middle

Q2 Fitness Assessments: PACER, Push up and Sit up

Soccer. Modified game play outside. Focused on passing to a target

Striking Manipulation with hands: moving into Volleyball and Pickleball game play

Middle School: Health lessons (curriculum follows Holt Lifetime Health)

Extra Notes:

No doubt, Soccer is a popular sport here at CCM!! All levels are focusing on soccer skills and basic manipulation of the ball with feet. Almost all students, regardless of their age, are more skilled soccer players than I. We have also entered Q2 with a focus on retesting for physical fitness at the upper elementary and middle school level. The goal is to track progress and hopefully see improvement in fitness scores. The students are tracking fitness scores on their individual fitness cards and trying to improve upon their baseline scores.

We will be moving into our volleyball/striking unit before the end of the year. Lower elementary and kindergarten students will be participating in activities that include overhead striking and continuous volleying with hands. Upper elementary and middle school students will be participating in volleyball skills and modified game play.

Sixth grade students learned how to use online navigation and research tools to plan their dream road trip adventure to five different US National Parks. Students had to plan their route, choose their car and calculate gas expenses (or charging needs for electric cars), and describe what activities they wanted to do at each park. They put together a Google Slides presentation to share their dream trip. In celebration of their work, we enjoyed the short movie National Parks Adventure and saw stunning video footage of the parks they researched.
